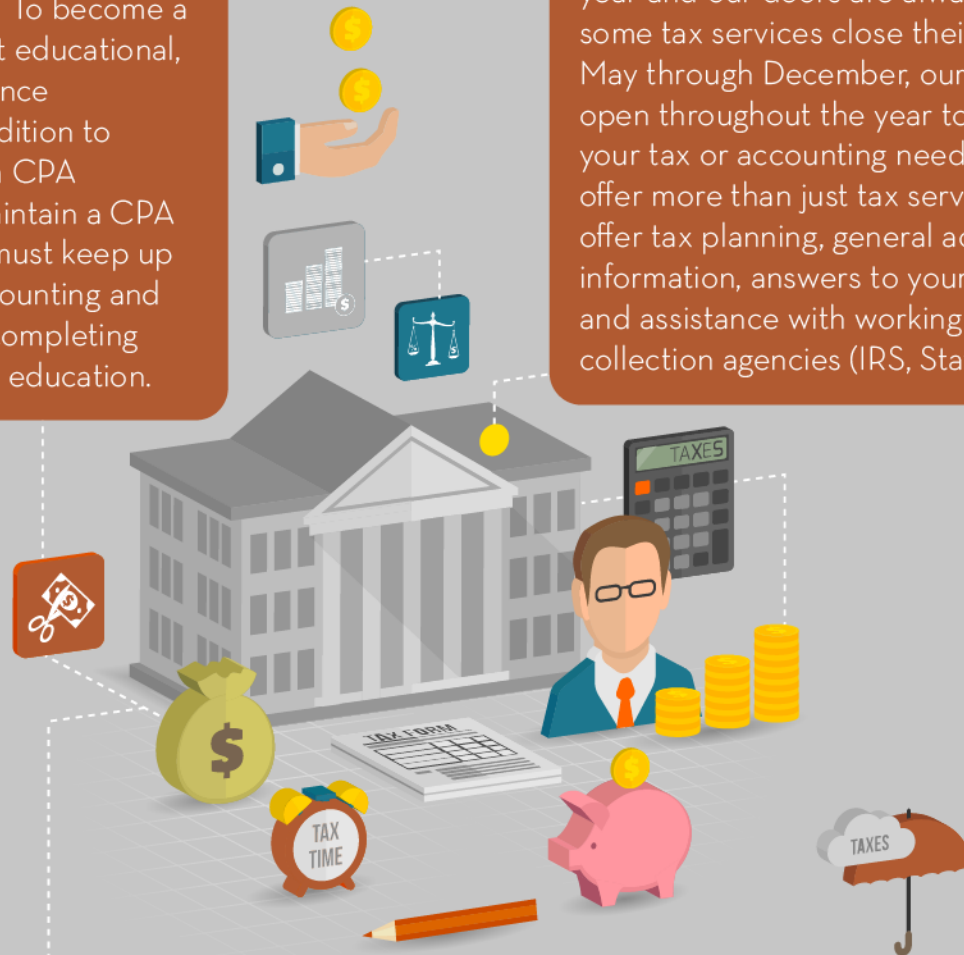


Licensing and Education

A CPA (Certified Public Accountant) is a certification issued by the state. To become a CPA you must meet educational, ethical, and experience requirements; in addition to passing the Uniform CPA Examination. To maintain a CPA license, each CPA must keep up with all current Accounting and Taxation issues by completing required continuing education.

Stability and Reliability
